

MAN WANTED FOR A YEAR DENIES TRUTH OF LARCENY CHARGE

Rufus Baldwin, Charged With Stealing Horse in 1920, Says No Grounds for Warrant

That there exists no ground whatever for his arrest on a grand larceny charge alleging stealing by him in June, 1920, of a horse belonging to Louis Dandrea, an employe of the Sheldon mine at Walker, was the contention of Rufus Baldwin yesterday morning, following his arrest late Monday night by Deputy Sheriff Grant Carter. Baldwin was taken into custody after officers had been searching for him for more than a year.

Alleging that Baldwin had stolen a horse belonging to him, Dandrea, in June, 1920, swore to a complaint charging Baldwin with grand larceny. Baldwin and the horse he was alleged to have stolen, according to officers, disappeared completely. The man was located late Monday night and induced to accept quarters in the county hostelry.

Baldwin yesterday intimated that upon his excepted release under bonds, he intends to bring suit against Dandrea for false imprisonment.
